Jean-Hippolyte Flandrin, *Christ's Entrance into Jerusalem*, 1842-1848, fresco, Church of Saint-Germain-des-Prés, Paris. French Neoclassical painter Jean-Hippolyte Flandrin (1809-1864) showed interest in the arts and a career as a painter from an early age. He was the second of three sons, all of whom became painters. Hippolyte and his brother Paul were apprentices in the studio of Jean-Auguste-Dominique Ingres, who became not only their instructor but their friend for life. In 1832, Hippolyte won the Prix de Rome, a prestigious art scholarship that ended his life of poverty. In 1853, Flandrin was elected to the Académie des Beaux-Arts and in 1856, his commission from the chapel of St John in the church of St Séverin further expanded his impressive reputation and virtually guaranteed him continuous employment for the rest of his life. Though Flandrin also painted a great number of portraits, including a portrait of Napoleon III, which was not very well received by the sitter, he is much more known today for his monumental decorative paintings in church settings. In 1863, his failing health, made worse by his hard work and extended exposure to the damp and draughts of churches, induced Flandrin to visit Italy again, where he died of smallpox in Rome in March of 1864.

Classes will be offered for three different age groups:

- Children ages three to second grade will engage in faith formation through Godly Play curriculum.
- Children in grades three to five will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. Our current curriculum is derived from the Memoria Press Christian Studies.
- Middle school youth in grades six to eight will study Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living. Youth will explore how they can live out their faith, as Jesus taught, in our modern world. The middle school youth will meet during worship two to three times per month. On the remaining Sundays, youth should participate in the full worship service.

Most Sundays, we will begin Sunday School with a brief opening in the chapel.

On Sundays when Communion is served in worship, the children will return to sit with their families so that they can participate.



FORUM ON THE HILL—BUILDING GHOSTS: PAST LIVES AND LOST PLACES IN A CHANGING CITY (registration required)

Recorded on April 10, 2025. "Building ghosts" are the idiosyncratic remnants or imprints of demolished buildings, left behind on the sides of neighboring structures. Mostly seen in older Northeastern cities with rowhomes or party-wall adjacencies, they can reveal remarkable things, such as an old staircase going up the side of a building or plaster traces left by a set of shelves in an attic gable. As history in our changing cities



can be quickly revealed and replaced in a neighborhood seeing rapid change or unveiled and never re-covered in a neighborhood that has not seen new construction in a long time.

Our traditional worship service connects with contemporary approaches to questions of faith and life. We support a wide range of mission partners throughout the city and are home to a number of music groups.

Our membership is drawn from the city and surrounding communities. We aspire to be an inclusive community of faith in our work and worship together.


