



Duccio di Buoninsegna, The Incredulity of St. Thomas, panel from the Maestà altarpiece, 1308-1311, Museo dell'Opera del Duomo, Siena, Italy. Commonly known as Duccio, the Italian painter (c. 1255–1260–c. 1318–1319) is considered one of the greatest Italian painters of the Middle Ages, and is credited with creating the painting styles of Trecento Gothic style and the Sienese school. An altarpiece composed of many individual paintings commissioned by the city of Siena in Tuscany in 1308, the Maestà, or Maestà of Duccio, was the first altarpiece to have both a front and back side. Though it took a generation for its effect to be truly felt, this masterwork set Italian painting on a course leading away from the Italo-Byzantine style towards more direct presentations of reality, as developed in the course of the Trecento (associated predominantly with the painter Giotto, who presumably was Duccio's pupil). Though Duccio's style was similar to Byzantine art, it was also different and more experimental: he broke down sharp lines and softened figures, using modeling to reveal the figures underneath heavy drapery; hands, faces, and feet became more rounded and three dimensional. Inviting and warm with color, his works are notable for the complex organization of space, placing characters specifically and purposefully in architectural settings. With a refined attention to emotion not seen in other painters, Duccio's characters interact tenderly with each other; shown with beautiful colors, soft hair, gracefulness, and detailed fabrics, Duccio's figures reflect a heavenly, otherworldly aura.

Classes will be offered for four different age groups:

- Children ages three to kindergarten will engage in faith formation through *Godly Play* curriculum.
- Children in first and second grades will enrich and synthesize their knowledge of our core faith stories through the *Growing in God's Love* curriculum.
- Children in grades three to five will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. Our current curriculum is derived from Memoria Press Christian Studies.
- Middle school youth in grades six to eight will study *Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living.* Youth will explore how they can live out their faith, as Jesus taught, in our modern world. The middle school youth will meet during worship two to three times per month. On the remaining Sundays, youth should participate in the full worship service.

MORRIS ARBORETUM: HOW A PRIVATE ESTATE BECAME

Unexpected things can happen when a benefactor wants to preserve her country estate a certain way but others have different plans in mind. In this case, the estate was Compton and the owners were Lydia T. Morris and her brother John T. Morris. It is now the Morris Arboretum and Gardens of Philadelphia. Lydia and John had barely begun to carry out a comprehensive plan for the future of their Chestnut Hill estate when a chronic ailment proved fatal for John in 1915. Lydia picked up where John left off but the plan was disrupted by war, economic depression and shifts in national priorities. 
