

GOSPEL LESSON Luke 24:13-35

NARRATOR: Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called

Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said

to them,

JESUS: "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?"

NARRATOR: They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was

Cleopas, answered him,

CLEOPAS: "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the

things that have taken place there in these days?"

NARRATOR: He asked them,

JESUS: "What things?"

NARRATOR: They replied,

DISCIPLES (CONGREGATION):

"The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him."

NARRATOR: Then he said to them,

JESUS: "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that

the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah

should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?"

NARRATOR: Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying,

"Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over."

NARRATOR: So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other,

COVER ART photograph of the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill, showing the steeple frame being added to the building, 1949, archives of the Chestnut Hill Conservancy (chconservancy.org). The building's stonework was done by the Lorenzon brothers, using stone from the basement. "Five Lorenzon brothers—Charles, Emilio, Vittorio, and Alberto—came to Chestnut Hill over a 10-year period beginning in 1896. Their father, Vincenzo Lorenzon, had trained them as skilled stonemasons. The Italian economy weakened c. 1900, causing many to emigrate. Some 200 families moved to Chestnut Hill from Poffabro, leaving that Italian village with half its former population." (Chestnut Hill Revisited, Jarvis, 2004). This photograph, among others, was provided to the Conservancy by Karen Lorenzon, daughter-in-law of Herbert (Alberto).



SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

On Sunday mornings we offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2nd grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.


