

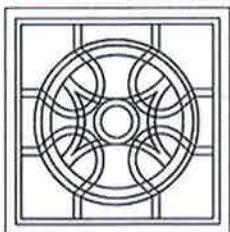

COVER ART Thomas Moran, *The Much Resounding Sea*, oil on canvas, 1884, National Gallery of Art. Thomas Moran began his artistic career as a teenage apprentice at a Philadelphia wood-engraving firm. Although he mastered multiple printing media including wood-engraving, etching, and lithography, he received renown for his paintings in oil and in watercolor. His sketches from an expedition to explore the unknown Yellowstone region captured the nation's attention and helped inspire Congress to establish Yellowstone as the first national park in 1872. Moran's first national recognition as an artist, as well as his first large financial success, resulted from his connection with Yellowstone. He even adopted a new signature: T-Y-M, Thomas "Yellowstone" Moran.

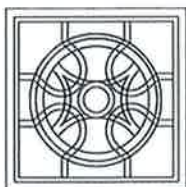
