





Amen.



OLD TESTAMENT LESSON

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. MENTAL HEALTH OF OLDER ADULTS

The world's population is aging rapidly. Between 2015 and 2050, the proportion of older adults is estimated to almost double from about 12 % to 22 % or from 900 million people to 2 billion people over the age of 60. These numbers are significant as many older adults also have one or more medical issues and may also experience reduced mobility, chronic pain, frailty or other chronic conditions. Along with the referenced medical conditions, they are more likely to experience events such as bereavement, a drop in socioeconomic status with retirement, and other individualized stressors that can result in devastating psychological distress. The program will address mental health issues, their risk factors and necessary resources to meet their needs.

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
