




Worship Notes

Portions of this morning's liturgy were adapted from the Matthew 25 resources offered by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

Music Notes

Ralph Vaughan Williams, born 150 years ago, was an English composer whose works include operas, ballets, chamber music, secular and religious vocal pieces and orchestral compositions including nine symphonies, written over sixty years. In addition to his studies with Maurice Ravel, Vaughan Williams was strongly influenced by Tudor music and English folk-song; his output marked a decisive break in British music from its German-dominated style of the 19th century. He is one of the best known British symphonists, and his symphonies are noted for their very wide range of moods, from stormy and impassioned to tranquil, from mysterious to exuberant. Among the most familiar of his other concert works are Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis (1910) and The Lark Ascending (1914). Coming from a family with strong moral views and a progressive social life, he sought to be of service to his fellow citizens, and believed in making music as available as possible to everybody. This morning's hymn tune, Down Ampney, was composed by Vaughan Williams and named after his birthplace. He arranged and harmonized our second hymn, Kingsfold. We sang King's Weston last week, another of his compositions.

Born June 2, 1953, Cornel Ronald West is an American philosopher, political activist, social critic, actor, and public intellectual. A socialist, West draws intellectual contributions from multiple traditions, including Christianity, the Black church, Marxism, neopragmatism, and transcendentalism. Among his most influential books are *Race Matters* (1994) and *Democracy Matters* (2004). He has held professorships and fellowships at Harvard University, Yale University, Union Theological Seminary, Princeton University, Dartmouth College, Pepperdine University, and the University of Paris during his career. He is also a frequent commentator on politics and social issues in many media outlets.

This affirmation from the 20th century theologian Emil Brunner speaks clearly to the growing mission and vision of the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill.

Throughout the heart of the pandemic and now as we re-emerge, our social witness activities help to meet the needs of our neighbors while serving to re-vitalize our community of faith.

There is no easy way to quantify our budget commitment to what we call social witness. We earmark approximately \$80,000 each year to support our mission partners—Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry, Heeding God's Call, Dawn's Place, Centurion Ministries, Habitat for Humanity, Anti-Violence Partnership, Our Brother's Place, Broad Street Ministry, and Souls Shot Portrait Project.

But it's even more than that—

It's backpacks filled with school supplies for PIHN, coats and gloves for West Kensington Ministry, Christmas gifts for Achievability, supplies for Face to Face.

It's a growing relationship with West Kensington Ministry and a new relationship with The Common Place.

It's hosting the opening exhibition of the Souls Shot Portrait Project and the Memorial to the Lost t-shirt display from Heeding God's Call.

Our Matthew 25 commitment focuses on systemic racism and poverty. It also acknowledges that as we address these issues from a faith perspective that our life as a congregation will be re-vitalized.

Your pledges—offered on November 20—will support this important work as we seek to serve God by our service to our neighbors.

The first of four Dinner Church intergenerational gatherings occurs on October 23. Different ministry groups will host each event. Our host for October are leaders for adult, youth and children ministries. Participants are asked to bring a pot luck item to share. CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES

SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

We offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2nd grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.


