
NEW TESTAMENT LESSON

COVER ART William Blake, Moses Indignant at the Golden Calf, tempera on canvas, 1799-1800, the Tate Gallery, London. William Blake (1757-1827) was an English poet, painter, and printmaker. Largely unrecognized during his life, Blake is now considered a seminal figure in the history of the poetry and visual art of the Romantic Age. He produced a diverse and symbolically rich collection of works, which embraced the imagination as "the body of God" or "human existence itself." Although Blake's idiosyncratic views were dismissed by his contemporaries as evidence of his insanity, he came to be highly regarded by later critics and readers for his expressiveness and creativity, and for the philosophical and mystical undercurrents within his work. A committed Christian who was hostile to the Church of England (indeed, to almost all forms of organized religion), Blake was influenced by the ideals and ambitions of the French and American revolutions. Despite these known influences, the singularity of Blake's work makes him difficult to classify.


