




GERMANTOWN AVENUE CRISIS MINISTRY THANKSGIVING BASKETS

PCCH continues its tradition of helping our neighbors "down the Avenue" have enough for Thanksgiving, as those in need continue to be disproportionately affected by the economic effects of the pandemic. We will be collecting food donations for Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry's Thanksgiving basket program **through Sunday**, **November 14**. They are hoping to serve over 100 households.

Please bring your food donations to church (Sundays or during the week) in **reusable shopping bags** (supporting GACM's efforts to train food cupboard clients to use reusable bags, a behavior far better for the environment), or make a donation (\$45, the suggested cost of goods for a family) via the church, noting "GACM" on the memo line. Please leave turkeys/chickens in the kitchen freezer.

Here's a list of suggested items:

Food Items

Meat: Turkey, turkey breast, roasting chicken

Starch: rice, mashed potatoes, yams, macaroni and cheese, corn stuffing

Vegetables: green beans, green peas

Bread: rolls, corn bread mix

Dessert: cake mix, icing, cookie mix, jello, pie crust, pie filling

Other: gravy, cranberry sauce, seasonings, sugar, flour, juice, iced tea, canned milk

Volunteers are also needed to help distribute baskets! Let John Wilkinson know if you would like to help with this.


