


CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES

SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

We offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children both to experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2nd grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH MUSIC

Joyful Noise, our children's choir, has weekly rehearsals immediately following Church School on Sunday mornings, concluding at 11:40 a.m. All children through grade 5 are invited to participate.

Youth Choir, now under the direction of Julie Snyder, will meet this year at a new time, Sundays from 4:30–5:00 p.m. All youth in grades 6-12 are invited to participate.

CALLING ALL KIDS

All children ages 3 through 5th grade who like to sing are invited to join Joyful Noise, our Children's choir, as they rehearse and perform the musical *Who Built the Ark*?, based on the Old Testament story of Noah. Children who participate will gain confidence, musical



and theatrical skills, and an understanding of the relevance of Noah's story to their lives. Church attendance is not required for participation, and friends are welcome to join us. Rehearsals will take place on Sundays from 11:10 a.m.–12:10 p.m. (children who are not yet in kindergarten will be dismissed at 11:40 a.m.). Rehearsal dates: January 8–May 7 (no rehearsal 2/5, 2/12, 4/9. Performance date: Sunday, May 14 at 10:00 a.m. during the worship service. Scan the QR code to register. Deadline to register is January 2.

On Sunday, November 6 at 10:00 a.m., the PCCH Gallery Choir will present Thomas Luis da Victoria's *Requiem* during worship as part of our Souls Shot/All Saints weekend. The *Requiem* sets texts from the Mass for the Dead for six unaccompanied voice parts in the pinnacle of Spanish Renaissance style. With the *Requiem aeternam* plainchant woven throughout the piece, the work takes on an ancient, mystical ethos while incorporating the striking harmonic dissonances of Victoria's time. His final composition, the *Requiem* was written in Madrid in 1603 for the funeral of Empress Maria, daughter of Empresr V.

STRONG BONES EXERCISE CLASS

Tuesdays, November 1–December 6, 1:00–2:00p.m., \$72 for 6 week session or \$15/per class Did you know that 1 in 2 women and 1 in 4 men over the age of 50 will have an osteoporosisrelated fracture in their remaining lifetime, and that osteoporosis is responsible for 1.5 million fractures a year in the United States? Hundreds of clinical studies have indisputably proven that doing the right exercises, improving your balance, and making some lifestyle changes, are critical factors in building stronger bones. In addition, active lifestyles are associated with reducing the risk of hip fracture by half. 
