



The opening voluntary was chosen to commemorate Ralph Vaughan Williams' 150th birthday, which is this Wednesday, October 12. The *Rhosymedre* tune was used by Vaughan Williams as the basis of the second movement of his organ composition *Three Preludes on Welsh Hymn Tunes*. There are many arrangements of this popular organ work, and it was performed at Princess Diana's funeral as well as at the weddings of her two sons.

Cover Art Artemisia Gentileschi, Mary Magdalene as Melancholy, circa 1622-25, oil on canvas, Museo Soumaya, Mexico City. The painting presents Magdalene as a personification of Melancholia, and via comparison with Gentileschi's Judith Beheading Holofernes, is likely a self-portrait of the artist. Artemisia Lomi or Artemisia Gentileschi (1593-c. 1656) is considered among the most accomplished seventeenth-century artists, initially working in the style of Caravaggio. She was producing professional work by the age of fifteen. Many of Gentileschi's paintings feature women from myths, allegories, and the Bible, including victims, suicides, and warriors. Gentileschi was known for being able to depict the female figure with great naturalism and for her skill in handling color to express dimension and drama, and is now regarded as one of the most progressive and expressive painters of her generation.

Renew a right spirit...

Your Stewardship Committee has identified these few words, taken from Psalm 51, as the theme that will help us frame our stewardship efforts over the coming weeks.

There is a lot going on in those few words: *Renew. Right. Spirit*.

We are always in the process of renewal, whether it's the seasons of the calendar or the seasons of our lives. Fall 2022 is certainly a season of renewal for the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill. Though the COVID pandemic is not quite over, we are entering a new phase, and seeing more and more people return to church. We are trying new things as ways of connecting with each other. We are welcoming new families and guests. We are seeking to live more fully into our Matthew 25 commitment. Renewal is all around.

Religion is often painted with an unfortunate brush, though sometimes deserved. That is, it is not about right and proper behavior, of drawing immovable lines between what is acceptable, or not, and who is in, and not. That's not what the psalmist means here. The old Shaker hymn *Simple Gifts* has it—"till by turning, turning, we come down right."

In this psalm, this is about our spirit, each of us and all of us. And it is also about God's Spirit. A "right" spirit is in faithful relationship with self, neighbor and God.

All of this will lead to Stewardship Sunday on **November 20**, a time of celebrating and giving thanks.

Watch your mail box, your inbox, and your social media feed for messages over these coming weeks. Prayerfully consider how you can support this vision—that your spirit might be renewed as we continue to experience renewal at 8855 Germantown Avenue and all the places the Spirit leads us.

CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES

DINNER CHURCH

Sunday, October 23, 5:00 p.m., Widener

The first of four Dinner Church intergenerational gatherings occurs on October 23. Different ministry groups will host each event. Our host for October are leaders for adult, youth and children ministries. Participants are asked to bring a pot luck item to share. We will gather at 5:00 p.m. in Widener Hall and join in activities to build our relationships with one another.

SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

We offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2nd grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.

JOSH HITCHENS, Haunted History of Philadelphia

As one of the most haunted cities in the nation, the City of Brotherly Love is a haven for unexplained phenomena. The specter of an innocent waiter murdered in 1783 is sometimes seen breaking dishes and smashing glasses at the City Tavern, once a meeting-house for George Washington, Paul Revere, and other patriots. Haunting footsteps are still heard among the cellblocks of Eastern State Penitentiary. Among the picturesque streets of Chestnut Hill sits Baleroy Mansion, whose plethora of supernatural hosts has earned the home the nickname of "the most haunted house in America." Author and paranormal historian Josh Hitchens will discuss some of the chilling tales from Philly's past and present that are featured in his book *Haunted History of Philadelphia*.


