

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



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Cover Art In this mosaic image stretching 340 light-years across, the James Webb Space Telescope's Near-Infrared Camera (NIRCam) displays the Tarantula Nebula star-forming region in a new light, including tens of thousands of never-before-seen young stars that were previously shrouded in cosmic dust. The most active region appears to sparkle with massive young stars, appearing pale blue. Scattered among them are still-embedded stars, appearing red, yet to emerge from the dusty cocoon of the nebula. NIRCam is able to detect these dustenshrouded stars thanks to its unprecedented resolution at near-infrared wavelengths. To the upper left of the cluster of young stars, and the top of the nebula's cavity, an older star prominently displays NIRCam's distinctive eight diffraction spikes, an artifact of the telescope's structure. Following the top central spike of this star upward, it almost points to a distinctive bubble in the cloud. Young stars still surrounded by dusty material are blowing this bubble, beginning to carve out their own cavity. Astronomers used two of Webb's spectrographs to take a closer look at this region and determine the chemical makeup of the star and its surrounding gas. This spectral information will tell astronomers about the age of the nebula and how many generations of star birth it has seen. Farther from the core region of hot young stars, cooler gas takes on a rust color, telling astronomers that the nebula is rich with complex hydrocarbons. This dense gas is the material that will form future stars. As winds from the massive stars sweep away gas and dust, some of it will pile up and, with gravity's help, form new stars. Suzanne Duchesne Guest Preacher and Forum Leader Sunday, October 2




Professor Duchesne, a United Methodist minister, will be our guest preacher on October 2, World Communion Sunday.

SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

We offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2^{nd} grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.

FALL BOOK GROUP

Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants by Robin Wall Kimmerer is our church-wide book study this year.

Our first discussion will be **Sunday, September 25, Second Hour, Reception Room.** A copy of the book, for borrowing, is in the church office.

Kimmerer describes her book as a braid of stories meant to heal our relationships with the world. Below are some reflection questions for the first three essays, to get you reflecting on your own stories.

Reflection Questions for discussing Braiding Sweetgrass

1. In *Skywoman Falling* Kimmerer tells the origin story of how the earth came into being. What is the origin story you have about how your family came into being? Or, of how the world came into being? In what ways do your origin stories help you consider where you came from and how we can go forward?

2. *The Council of Pecans* speaks of honoring and being tied to the land, of what occurs through seasons of feast and famine and the lessons of sticking together, acting as one. What have you learned from being connected to a particular place? What experiences do you have of sticking together, acting as one?

3. *The Gift of Strawberries* is a story about grace. Grace—meaning gifts we do not earn or possibly deserve—that come to us free, without any effort on our part, meant to be appreciated. What stories would you tell of grace, particularly God's grace and generosity in your life?


