

Henry Ossawa Tanner, *Les trois Marie approachant du tombeau (Three Marys)*, ca. 1910, oil on canvas. Tanner (1859-1937) was an American artist who spent much of his career in France. Oldest of nine children born to a minister in Pittsburgh, Tanner enrolled at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in 1879 where he became a favorite of the painter Thomas Eakins. Tanner moved to Paris in 1891 to study at the Académie Julian, gaining acclaim in French circles. By 1895 he was creating mostly religious works. His shift to painting biblical scenes occurred as he was undergoing a spiritual struggle. In a letter he wrote to his parents on Christmas 1896, he stated, "I have made up my mind to serve Him [God] more faithfully." In the late 1890s, after seeing Tanner's paintings of biblical themes, Philadelphia art patron Rodman Wanamaker sponsored Tanner's trip to the Mutasarrifate of Jerusalem, after which his paintings developed a powerful air of mystery and spirituality.


GERMANTOWN AVENUE CRISIS MINISTRY FOOD DONATIONS

APRIL 11 AMY JANE COHEN BLACK HISTORY IN THE PHILADELPHIA LANDSCAPE

Amy Cohen joins us to discuss her book Black History in the Philadelphia Landscape.

Black Philadelphians have shaped Philadelphia history since colonial times. Amy Cohen recounts notable aspects of the Black experience in Philadelphia from the late 1600s to the 1960s and how this history is marked in the contemporary city.

Showing how increased attention to the role of African Americans in local and national history has resulted in numerous, sometimes controversial, alterations to the landscape. Cohen will discuss Black history's significance and its connections with today's spotlight on racial justice.

Classes will be offered for three different age groups:

- Children ages 3 to 2nd grade will engage in faith formation through Godly Play curriculum.

STRONG BONES EXERCISE CLASS-Special DROP IN Class (registration required)

Tuesday, April 2, 1-2 p.m., \$15, space is limited Did you know that one in two women and one in four men over the age of 50 will have an osteoporosis-related fracture in their remaining lifetime, and that osteoporosis is responsible for 1.5 million fractures a year in the United States? It doesn't have to be this way! Hundreds of clinical studies have indisputably proven that doing the right exercises, improving your balance, and making some lifestyle changes, are critical factors in building stronger bones. In addition, active lifestyles are associated with reducing the risk of hip fracture by half. This class will include standing and floor exercises to improve postural alignment, balance, and strength. Bring your own mat, but other equipment is provided.

PAINTING SHADOW AND LIGHT (registration required)


