




OLD TESTAMENT AND EPISTLE LESSONS

Exodus 24:12-28 2 Peter 1:16-21

The Lord said to Moses, 'Come up to me on the mountain, and wait there; and I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have written for their instruction.' So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up into the mountain of God. To the elders he had said, 'Wait here for us, until we come to you again; for Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them.' Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. The glory of the Lord settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the majestic glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

COVER ART Carl Bloch, *Transfiguration of Jesus*, 1872, oil on canvas, Frederiksborg Palace. Bloch (1834-1890) was born in Copenhagen, Denmark. Though his parents hoped he would become a Navy officer, he was consumed with the desire to make art his career. He studied in both Italy and the Netherlands, where the works of Rembrandt were a profound influence on his painting. His first great success was the exhibition of his *Prometheus Unbound* in 1865, and he was later commissioned to produce 23 paintings of the life of Christ for the King's Chapel at Frederiksborg Palace in Denmark. At the time of the painter's death, prominent Danish art critic Karl Madsen stated that Bloch reached higher toward the great heaven of art than all other Danish art up to that date, saying "if there is an Elysium, where the giant, rich, warm and noble artist souls meet, there Carl Bloch will sit among the noblest of them all."

CALL FOR ARTISTS—2023 STATIONS OF THE CROSS THROUGH ARTISTS' EYES at WEST KENSINGTON MINISTRY

The Stations of the Cross, also called the Way of the Cross, is a devotion to the passion of Christ consisting of prayers and meditations on fourteen occurrences that were experienced by Christ on his way to the crucifixion. During the time of the Crusades (1095-1270), it became popular for pilgrims in the Holy Land to walk in the footsteps of Jesus to Calvary. Originally done only outdoors, the Stations were allowed inside churches in the mid-18th century.


WOMEN'S RETREAT





SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

We offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2^{nd} grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.



Older individuals were already at risk for loneliness and depression pre-pandemic, and then came the public health restrictions of Covid-19. It's been three years since the pandemic began and most public health restrictions have been lifted. But many of us have not experienced a full return to "normal." We may have noticed declines in our physical condition and mobility, or we may admit to anxiety about returning to some of the activities we loved pre-pandemic. Results of research already conducted suggest that the psychological effects of public health restrictions rather than normal aging are believed to be at the root of some of this decline or disruption of our social rituals, and the incomplete restoration of our former behaviors. 




