

FLOWERS IN THE SANCTUARY are given to the glory of God and in loving memory of the loved ones of Dolores Edwards.

COVER ART Christ calls Apostles Peter and Andrew as fishermen, 6th century mosaic, Basilica of Sant'Apollinaire Nuovo, Ravenna, Italy. This basilica church was erected by the Ostrogothic king Theodoric the Great as his palace chapel during the first quarter of the 6th century (as attested to in the Liber Pontificalis). This Arian church was originally dedicated in 504 AD to "Christ the Redeemer." It was reconsecrated in 561 AD, under the rule of the Byzantine emperor Justinian I, under the new name "Sanctus Martinus in Coeloo Aureo" ("Saint Martin in Golden Heaven"). Suppressing the Arian church, the church was dedicated to Saint Martin of Tours, a foe of Arianism. According to legend, Pope Gregory the Great ordered that the mosaics in the church be blackened, as their golden glory distracted worshipers from their prayers. The basilica was renamed again in 856 AD when relics of Sant'Apollinaire were transferred from the Basilica of Sant'Apollinaire in Classe because of the threat posed by frequent raids of pirates from the Adriatic Sea.




