



OLD TESTAMENT LESSON

Micah 6:1-8

Hear what the Lord says: Rise, plead your case before the mountains, and let the hills hear your voice. Hear, you mountains, the controversy of the Lord, and you enduring foundations of the earth; for the Lord has a controversy with his people, and he will contend with Israel. 'O my people, what have I done to you? In what have I wearied you? Answer me! EPISTLE LESSON

1 Corinthians 1:18-31

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, 'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.' Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, 'Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord.'

FLOWERS IN THE SANCTUARY are given to the glory of God and in celebration of **All God's Children** by Sharon Kelly and family.

COVER ART Jan Bruegel the Elder, *Sermon on the Mount*, 1598, oil on copper, the Getty Museum. In this small painting, the figure of Christ is almost lost amid the dense, multicolored crowd. Identified by a pale yellow halo, Christ stands on a rustic podium near the crowd's center. He presents his sermon on the conditions of blessedness. Behind Christ, his disciples pay rapt attention, but many in the diverse throng prefer to socialize with one another. In the foreground, a gnarled gypsy tells fortunes and a vendor sells pretzels. To the right, below a distant vista, a man in a long coat and dark hat directs two women in elegant gowns toward the crowd. Painted on a thin sheet of copper, this festive scene's bright colors, fine details, and enamel-like finish are accentuated by the hard surface. Bruegel (Flemish, 1568-1625) had an unmatched ability to describe figures and landscape in great detail, transforming the painting into a jewel-like object intended for close scrutiny.

FEBRUARY 9 12:30PM ERIC CORSON REACHING BEYOND PRISON WALLS

Eric joins us to discuss his book "Reaching Beyond Prison Walls: Stories of Volunteer Visitors and the Prisoners They See", that was published in 2021. A 44 year resident of Germantown, he spent decades visiting 110 of the nation's 122 federal prisons and running the nonprofit organization, Prisoner Visitation and Support (PVS). Upon retiring in 2017, Eric went on a two and a half year nationwide "Farewell tour" to thank volunteer prison visitors, interviewing over 100 of them, then spending over four months editing their stories, along with prisoners stories for his book. He will be discussing these stories and leading the conversation about the importance of the work he has done with PVS and what continues to be done.

Born in Minnesota, Eric Corson grew up in Queens, New York. In 1967, while the Vietnam War was raging, Eric applied for conscientious-objector status and received it. So instead of serving in the military, he was allowed to do two years of alternative service working with the American Friends Service Committee in Columbus, Ohio. In that job, he visited many young men who were in prison for refusing to fight in Vietnam. Eric came to Philadelphia in 1977 to take over the directorship of PVS, which is headquartered here, overseeing about 400 volunteer visitors who come from all walks of life.

MANDER ORGAN UPDATE

One of the most vital components of a pipe organ is the blower. This is the device that supplies the wind enabling the pipes to sound. It's an electrically powered turbine that maintains a steady wind supply for the organ. On January 4, the blower was removed and taken to Reading Electric where it will be rebuilt. As of last Wednesday, the blower motor has been repaired and tested. Installation is planned for this week.

We'd like to glean your wisdom about our future directions and needed leadership qualities. Join us on February 6 for a time of listening and interaction.

SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

We offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2^{nd} grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.


