



EPISTLE LESSON

What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? 'Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

GOSPEL LESSON

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesusby night and said to him, 'Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' Jesus answered him, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?' Jesus answered, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, "You must be born from above." The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can these things be?' Jesus answered him, 'Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. 'Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

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COVER ART Henry Ossawa Tanner, *Study for Christ and Nicodemus on a Rooftop*, ca. 1923, oil on wood panel, Smithsonian American Art Museum. Henry Ossawa Tanner (1859–1937) was the most distinguished African American artist of the 19th century and the first African American artist to attain a reputation abroad. (The finished piece is in the collection of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, where Tanner was a student of Thomas Eakins.) Never leaving the demands for realism of his contemporary art world, Tanner shows Nicodemus seated on a rooftop at night in intense dialogue with Jesus. The setting is authentic—Tanner traveled to Palestine to study its landscape and ways in order to be true to it. Tanner's rendering of Nicodemus and Jesus shows his close reading of the Gospel of John: the artist unites the prologue of John ('what has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it... The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.') with Nicodemus' deep conversation and with Jesus' declaration 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life.' (John 8:12). (excerpted commentary by Laurel Gasque, *Artway Visual Meditation*, December 2010)

CALL FOR ARTISTS–2023 STATIONS OF THE CROSS THROUGH ARTISTS' EYES at WEST KENSINGTON MINISTRY

The Stations of the Cross, also called the Way of the Cross, is a devotion to the passion of Christ consisting of prayers and meditations on fourteen occurrences that were experienced by Christ on his way to the crucifixion. During the time of the Crusades (1095-1270), it became popular for pilgrims in the Holy Land to walk in the footsteps of Jesus to Calvary. Originally done only outdoors, the Stations were allowed inside churches in the mid-18th century.





SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

We offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2nd grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2nd grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.

MAKE A MOSAIC PANEL (registration required, space is limited)

Tuesdays, March 7–21 (3 Class Session), 1:00–4:00 p.m., \$55, all materials provided. In this class, students will design, sculpt, glaze and set a 8"x8" bas relief mosaic "puzzle" using the bas relief method of tile making. Selection of imagery is up to the individual, but should include opportunities to create bas relief and textural areas. Consider using a favorite photo, design or sketch as your inspiration for your mosaic. Please come to the first session with an idea for your panel, sized (printed out, black and white) to 8"x 8". All levels of experience welcome.

Session #1, 3 hours: Outline design onto plastic sheeting, roll out slab, transfer design. Use bas relief and texture to create image. Cut panel into puzzle pieces (while wet clay).

Session #2, 3 hours: Use underglazes to decorate your mosaic puzzle.

Session #3, 2 hours: The glazed pieces will be adhered to the wood substrate and will be grouted to complete the project.





Sunday, March 26 noon until 3 p.m. led by John Wilkinson




Rachel Srubas' book offers daily reflections to be read throughout Lent.

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
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
