

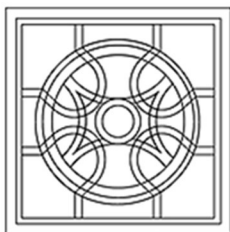

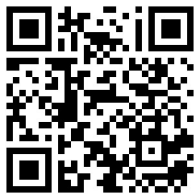
Welcome to the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill!

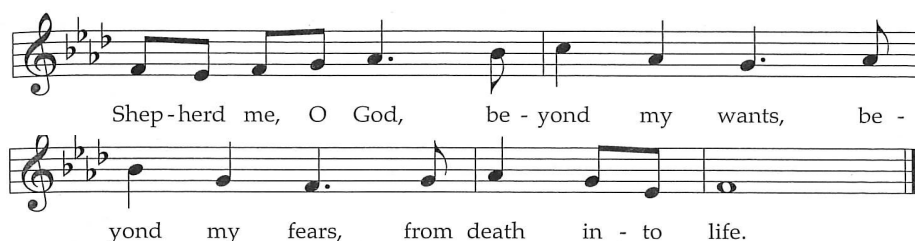

William Charles Thomas Dobson, *The Good Shepherd*, 1868, oil on canvas, Sheffield Museums, England. An English painter, Dobson (1817-1898) was born in Germany to an English merchant. On the family's return to London, Dobson was educated and joined the Royal Academy schools where he was a student of the prominent painter and academician Charles Locke Eastlake. After a short time as a headmaster of the government school of design in Birmingham, he travelled to Italy and next to Germany, where he was impressed by the Nazarene school, a group of early 19th-century German Romantic painters who aimed to revive spirituality in art. (The name Nazarene was initiated as a term of derision for their affectations in adopting Biblical-inspired clothing and hairstyles.) On returning to England, Dobson took up religious painting. A prolific watercolorist, he was a member of the Royal Academy and the Royal Watercolour Society, to which he contributed almost 200 works during his tenure. In 1878 he was a British juror for the Exposition Universelle in Paris and contributed three watercolors to that exposition.

Classes will be offered for four different age groups:

- Children ages three to kindergarten will engage in faith formation through *Godly Play* curriculum.
- Children in first and second grades will enrich and synthesize their knowledge of our core faith stories through the *Growing in God's Love* curriculum.
- Children in grades three to five will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. Our current curriculum is derived from Memoria Press Christian Studies.
- Middle school youth in grades six to eight will study *Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living*. Youth will explore how they can live out their faith, as Jesus taught, in our modern world. The middle school youth will meet during worship two to three times per month. On the remaining Sundays, youth should participate in the full worship service.

Most Sundays, we will begin Sunday School with a brief opening in the chapel.

On Sundays when Communion is served in worship, the children will return to sit with their families so that they can participate.

FORUM ON THE HILL

If you missed this past weeks fascinating Forum, you can watch it here: tinyurl.com/4dydsaad. Recorded on May 8, 2025. Nelson A. Diaz: *Not from here, not from there—No soy de aquí ni de allá*. Raised in the squalor of a New York tenement until he was 10 years old, Nelson Díaz saw his life change when his family moved to a brand-new high-rise project in West Harlem in the 1950s. That experience, along with lessons learned as the only Latino law student at Temple University, would drive him throughout his life as a lawyer and activist, fighting for the expansion of rights for all Americans. “No soy de aquí ni de allá” is a mantra for Puerto Ricans who feel like foreigners wherever they are and who seek a place for themselves. Whether as a leader in economic development, a pioneer in court reform, or a champion of fair housing, Díaz has never stopped advocating for others. Díaz was happy to be the first Latino to “do something,” but he never wanted to be the last. Hear his story about an outsider who worked his way to the inside that offers powerful lessons on finding a place in the world by creating spaces where everyone is welcome.

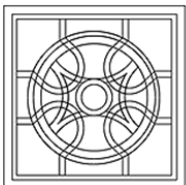
