



Rembrandt Harmenszoon van Rijn (1606-1669), usually known as Rembrandt, was a Dutch Golden Age painter, printmaker, and draftsman. An innovative and prolific master in three media, he is generally considered to be one of the greatest visual artists in the history of art. Rembrandt produced a total of about three hundred paintings, three hundred etchings, and two thousand drawings. Unlike most Dutch masters of the 17th century, Rembrandt's works depict a wide range of styles and subject matter, from portraits and self-portraits to landscapes, genre scenes, allegorical and historical scenes, biblical and mythological themes, and animal studies.



APRIL 11 AMY JANE COHEN BLACK HISTORY IN THE PHILADELPHIA LANDSCAPE

Amy Cohen joins us to discuss her book Black History in the Philadelphia Landscape.

Black Philadelphians have shaped Philadelphia history since colonial times. Amy Cohen recounts notable aspects of the Black experience in Philadelphia from the late 1600s to the 1960s and how this history is marked in the contemporary city.

Showing how increased attention to the role of African Americans in local and national history has resulted in numerous, sometimes controversial, alterations to the landscape. Cohen will discuss Black history's significance and its connections with today's spotlight on racial justice.


