


Following the 10 a.m. service, all are invited for refreshments and fellowship in Widener Hall.



### TODAY'S FLOWERS FOR PENTECOST

Today's arrangements in red, yellow and orange symbolize the Pentecostal flames that appeared to the Apostles and other followers of Jesus fifty days after the resurrection. The apostles had gathered to celebrate the feast of the Summer Harvest. A great wind was heard and what looked like flames appeared on the heads of the disciples and each began to speak in tongues. This presence of the Holy Spirit is seen to mark the Christian churches' mission to the world.

## COVER ART curated by Rebecca Thornburgh

Rembrandt van Rijn, *Head of Christ*, 1648, oil on panel, Gemäldegalerie, Berlin. A Dutch Golden Age painter, printmaker, and draftsman, Rembrandt Harmenszoon van Rijn (1606-1669) is generally considered one of the greatest visual artists in the history of art. It is estimated Rembrandt produced a total of about three hundred paintings, three hundred etchings, and two thousand drawings in his lifetime. Possibly created for use as devotional objects, there were multiple versions of Rembrandt's *Head of Christ*. Today about a dozen are known, but only this one is considered by the Rembrandt Research Project to be by the master himself. A Rembrandt face is a face partially eclipsed; and the nose, bright and obvious, thrusting into the riddle of halftones, serves to focus the viewer's attention upon, and to dramatize, the division between a flood of light—an overwhelming clarity—and a brooding duskiness.

## HAPPENING AT PCCH

## A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR NOMINATING AND PERSONNEL COMMITTEES

The Pastor Nominating and Personnel Committees would like to update the congregation on our search for our new pastor and head of staff.

When we last communicated, the PNC was in the process of scheduling visits with three candidates. We also reminded our community that this is a process of mutual discernment, and we will not rush toward a compromise. After talking at length with references, visiting home churches, and spending time with three candidates, we will not be calling any of them as our next Pastor.

We understand this news may be disappointing. However, the PNC wants to reiterate that we are committed to getting this right and that this is the Holy Spirit at work. The process of discernment takes time. While the PNC wants to be in control, ultimately, this is God's decision.

The PNC has received valuable counsel from Craig and the Commission on Ministry about next steps and has been in close communication with the staff and the Personnel Committee. We are confident that with continued prayer and discernment, a unanimous and enthusiastic decision regarding our new church leadership will emerge. Thank you for your ongoing prayers and support as we continue this important search.

In the meantime, the Personnel Committee continues to work to ensure that we have strong pastoral leadership during this transitional time. Russell has committed to serve as our bridge pastor through the summer and into the beginning of the church calendar year. We are also working with him and the Commission on Ministry to identify additional support as needed and expect to provide further information to you shortly.


