


OLD TESTAMENT

Esther 7:1-6, 9-10, 9:20-22

So the king and Haman went in to feast with Queen Esther. On the second day, as they were drinking wine, the king again said to Esther, "What is your petition, Queen Esther? It shall be granted you. And what is your request? Even to the half of my kingdom, it shall be fulfilled." Then Queen Esther answered, "If I have won your favor, O king, and if it pleases the king, let my life be given me—that is my petition and the lives of my people—that is my request. For we have been sold, I and my people, to be destroyed, to be killed, and to be annihilated. If we had been sold merely as slaves, men and women, I would have held my peace; but no enemy can compensate for this damage to the king." Then King Ahasuerus said to Queen Esther, "Who is he, and where is he, who has presumed to do this?" Esther said, "A foe and enemy, this wicked Haman!" Then Haman was terrified before the king and the queen. Then Harbona, one of the eunuchs in attendance on the king, said, "Look, the very gallows that Haman has prepared for Mordecai, whose word saved the king, stands at Haman's house, fifty cubits high." And the king said, "Hang him on that." So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the anger of the king abated.

Mordecai recorded these things, and sent letters to all the Jews who were in all the provinces of King Ahasuerus, both near and far, enjoining them that they should keep the fourteenth day of the month Adar and also the fifteenth day of the same month, year by year, as the days on which the Jews gained relief from their enemies, and as the month that had been turned for them from sorrow into gladness and from mourning into a holiday; that they should make them days of feasting and gladness, days for sending gifts of food to one another and presents to the poor.

Kate Gardiner Hastings, *Esther*, oil on canvas. Born in London as Katherine Carr, Kate Gardiner Hastings (1837-1925) was a little-known painter of portraits, genre, and biblical narratives. She received her artistic education at the Slade School in London. From 1871-1876 she studied with John Poynter; upon the completion of her studies in 1877, she married Alfred Gardiner Hastings. For the next several years, she exhibited regularly, showing her work at the Dudley Gallery and the Walker Gallery. She exhibited four works at the Royal Academy between 1885 and 1888. This work was originally attributed to Edward Alfred Goodall, entitled *The Bride*, although it was subsequently re-attributed to Kate Gardiner Hastings.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The Session has called a meeting of the congregation for Sunday, October 6, 2024, following worship, for the purpose of electing a pastor.

UPDATE FROM THE PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Pastor Nominating Committee is pleased to announce that after an eleven-month search, we have made an offer to a candidate to become the next Senior Pastor and Head of Staff of The Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill, and our candidate has been enthusiastically approved by Presbytery. We couldn't be more thrilled with the candidate we have found, and think you will share our excitement!

This milestone is the culmination of the committee's painstaking screening of close to 75 candidates as we read resumes, listened to sermons, interviewed applicants by video and in person, and worked closely with a small number of the most promising candidates. The Session was informed of our decision at its meeting on September 17, and has called a Congregational Meeting for after worship on October 6, details of which you will find in the bulletin and e-news.

There is more you would like to hear and more we would like to tell you about both the candidate and the schedule of transition ahead. However, there are required steps to be taken in our Presbytery and in the Presbytery of the candidate, whose church must also be informed at the right moment. We must respect these steps and maintain confidentiality.

By late September, these steps will be completed and you will be given information about the candidate, who we feel will lead us with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love. For now, plan to be at the service of worship on Sunday, October 6 when the candidate will preach. A meeting of the congregation will follow the service when you will discuss and vote on the call of this person to be the next minister of PCCH.

We must stress the need for confidentiality about the identity of the candidate, even after you receive their introduction materials, until the candidate has had the opportunity to notify their current congregation.

In the meantime, we ask for your continued prayers now for the candidate and the candidate's church, as well as for our church.



Classes will be offered for three different age groups:

- Children ages 3-2nd grade will engage in faith formation through Godly Play curriculum.
- Children in grades 3–5 will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. We will be using the Memoria Press Christian Studies curriculum.
- Middle school youth in grades 6–8 will study Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living.


