




COVER ART Benjamin West, *The Ascension*, 1801, oil on canvas, Denver Art Museum. The tenth child of an innkeeper, born in Springfield, Pennsylvania (in a house now on the campus of Swarthmore College), West (1738-1820) was an entirely self-taught artist who painted numerous famous historical scenes such as *The Treaty of Paris* and *Benjamin Franklin Drawing Electricity from the Sky*. In 1779, by then established in London as the official historical painter of the court of George III, West was commissioned by the king to decorate the walls of the Royal Chapel at Windsor Castle with scenes from the Old and New Testament, a project that would engage him for the next two decades. He first painted the scene of Jesus ascending into heaven following his crucifixion and burial in about 1781-82, but the painting was never installed in the chapel. He returned to the subject twenty years later to produce this version; as was his practice, he created this study as a finished painting. Soon after its completion, King George appointed a new architect for the chapel project and West's commission was canceled.


